

PHILOSOPHICAL CONSCIENCE

Level 1 Philosophical Plumbing worksheet

Difficulty:

This is Mary Midgley.

Mary was a philosopher. Philosophers think about **Big Questions**. For example:

- What do people need to be happy?
- How are humans like other animals?
- How should we treat people that we love?

People often disagree about the answers to **Big Questions**. Mary thought that a philosopher needs to listen to lots of people's ideas before making up their own mind.

ACTIVITY 1

Here are some other examples of **Big Questions.**


Answer these questions. Then ask friends or family for their answers. Are they different?

Can you think of any Big Questions of your own?




Let's answer a Big Question together!

Mary was interested in the **Big Question**: "What do <u>people</u> need to be happy?"

This is an important **Big Question**. If we do not know the answer to this question then we might make schools, jobs, and a world that make people unhappy. To answer this **Big Question**, we can begin by asking lots of different people the smaller question: "What do <u>you</u> need to be happy?"

ACTIVITY 3

Connect the person to the answer. Add in a drawing of yourself and your answer.



'Philosophical Plumbing' is Mary's idea about how we can answer **Big Questions**. Think about all the pipes in our houses and workplaces, and under the ground beneath our towns and cities.


Plumbers connect pipes so that water can flow. When pipes get blocked or need to be connected, they find the problem and fix it.

ACTIVITY 4

There's a problem with the plumbing...

- Which tap do you need to turn off to prevent the glass overflowing?
- Which pipe do you need to connect to water the flower?
- Which pipe do you need to unblock to flush the toilet?





<u>Philosophical</u> Plumbers also solve problems. They make connections and remove blockages when our ideas don't flow. They connect the different answers that different people give to make **Big Answers** to **Big Questions**. They find similarities and differences and connect ideas together.

ACTIVITY 5

Let's be philosophical plumbers!


Look at the different answers people gave to the question in Activity 3: "What do you need to be happy?"
